WHAT IS INFORMATION COMPETENCY?

Information Competency¹ has been defined as: "A set of abilities requiring individuals ... to recognize when information is needed and to have the ability to locate, evaluate, and use effectively the needed information."²

THE AWARENESS AND ABILITY ...

1. To discern and determine exactly the information needed.
 2. To seek, find, and retrieve this information efficiently and effectively.
 3. To use this information appropriately - including evaluating the accuracy and reliability of the information and citing it properly.
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Finding Books

The GCC Library maintains a small health sciences book collection that supports the nursing curriculum. Most nursing textbooks are available on "Reserve" and can be checked out for use within the library. Our reference collection has encyclopedias, dictionaries, handbooks, etc. that are for use within the library only. Our circulating collection includes print as well as electronic books. Students may request books (and journal articles) that GCC does not own through **interlibrary loan**.

Use the Library's online catalog to find books

1. Start from the Library's Homepage: <http://www.glendale.edu/library/index.html>
 2. Click the **Catalog** tab or the **Find books & more** link.
 3. Choose search mode: **Advanced Search**, **Basic Search**, **E-books**, etc.
 4. Type your search terms into text boxes; Click **Search**.
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Finding Periodical Articles

GCC Library's print periodical collection is very small. Some of the health sciences periodicals that we subscribe to in print include: *American Journal of Nursing (AJN)*, *JAMA*, *American Journal of Public Health*, *New England Journal of Medicine*. Most of our periodical subscriptions are electronic and can be accessed through our many subscription databases. This makes sense financially because we can subscribe to lots of periodicals electronically that we could not afford in print. It's makes sense for you because you can access these electronic databases from anywhere you have an Internet connection!

1. Start from the Library's Homepage: <http://www.glendale.edu/library/>
2. Click the **Article Databases** tab or the **Find Articles in Databases** link
3. Choose the database you want to search by clicking on its title. When you are using an off-campus computer you will be prompted to enter a username (your GCC ID number) and a password (your birth date in 6 digits—no punctuation).
